Introduction

Five years ago, Elizabeth Street Common Ground opened its doors and became home to 65 Melburnians in desperate need of housing and support.

The 11-storey residential building was the first of its kind to be purpose-built in Melbourne, designed to house and support the most vulnerable and disadvantaged people in our community.

It marked the culmination of more than three years of planning, development, fundraising and building by HomeGround Services (now Launch Housing), Yarra Community Housing, the Victorian and Federal Governments, construction company Grocon and a committed group of private companies, philanthropists and community service organisations.

It is almost impossible to overstate the importance of the first five years of this ambitious supportive housing project: lives have been saved, and changed for the better.

Not only have the tenants been given an opportunity to live in a safe, secure, healthy and affordable home but their on-site access to medical and health professionals, inclusion in a thriving community, and a range of learning opportunities have restored confidence, health, and prospects for a brighter future.

Before Elizabeth Street Common Ground, tenants routinely endured the dangers of sleeping rough, frequent trips to hospital emergency departments, undiagnosed and untreated health issues, police intervention and incarceration. For most, life was about day-to-day survival. Their lives were often characterised by chaos, addiction, eviction, uncertainty, family violence, abuse, isolation and despair.

Most have embraced the opportunity to get their lives on track, and while some have had to leave, many stay on and continue to contribute to their new community.

We'd like to thank our staff, supporters, tenants and all those who have made Elizabeth Street Common Ground a reality.

It's been challenging for us all, but we've learned important lessons about the Common Ground supportive housing model and how it works best in our city. It has proven to be a sustainable and successful model from which other innovative solutions can be developed.

We look forward to a bright future for Elizabeth Street Common Ground, and to developing further supportive housing opportunities so no Victorian is left without housing.





Our history

Based on a successful US model, Elizabeth Street Common Ground (ESCG) was the first supportive housing project of its kind in Melbourne, and only the second in Australia.

It was the realisation of a vision shared by HomeGround Services (now Launch Housing) and Yarra Community Housing for a supportive housing project that would offer safe, affordable and permanent housing and services for people experiencing chronic homelessness and severe disadvantage.

For many years, HomeGround had seen an increasing number of these people cycling through the homelessness and health systems, without any hope of achieving the secure housing and supports they needed. Their only accommodation options were rooming houses, short-term motel stays, couchsurfing with friends and family, or sleeping rough.

A broad partnership encompassing government departments, more than 50 private companies, leading philanthropists and a range of community services and organisations responded. They worked for more than three years to develop the concept, source funding, find an appropriate site, identify and invite potential tenants, and manage the myriad of details involved with building such an ambitious project from the ground up.

Key early supporters were the Victorian Government and construction company Grocon. Others quickly came on board including the Federal Government, Melbourne City Council, Rotary Club of Melbourne, the John T Reid Charitable Trust, the Collie Foundation, the Helen Macpherson Smith Trust, Royal District Nursing Service Homeless Persons Program, Melbourne General Practice Network, Centre for Adult Education, Wesley Mission, Green Collect, the Brotherhood of St Laurence, the University of NSW and a host of allied health practitioners.

The project was announced in May 2008 and construction was completed in August 2010.

Elizabeth Street Common Ground opened on 6 September 2010 and by November that year, all 131 single studio apartments were tenanted.

Since then, similar developments have opened in Brisbane, Sydney, Hobart, Adelaide, Port Augusta and Canberra.



Highlights

"My experience since living at Common Ground is that I have ceased seeking help from the different housing services, transitional housing, emergency accommodation, domestic violence services, and churches. I no longer need to access services for material aid; food vans, soup kitchens, vouchers or counselling. The monetary cost of being reliant on these services must be huge – perhaps someone could work this out and see how effective Common Ground is."

Challenges and successes

The first 18 months of operation were particularly challenging, and a steep learning curve for everyone.

There were a number of critical incidents, including some evictions. Launch Housing and Yarra Community Housing staff worked closely during this period to develop a range of policies and procedures to ensure that the safety of tenants was maintained, and that problems were dealt with early so that evictions could be averted wherever possible.


We developed stricter visitor management policies, which had, and continue to have, a positive influence on the Elizabeth Street Common Ground community.

Over the years, a number of tenancies have ended as result of planned exit to more appropriate accommodation, re-incarceration, eviction for violence and/ or anti-social behaviour or abandonment of their tenancy. There have also been nine deaths in the five years.

However, overall, moving into Elizabeth Street Common Ground has demonstrably improved tenants' lives, and shown that this type of support can form an important part of our approach towards ending homelessness. "The personal highlight for me has been the story of a tenant who was so anxious and tearful during assessment that I thought he was going to walk out and never return. With support from our team, he didn't walk out. He stayed and made his home around him. Now, I can't imagine the place without him."

Elizabeth Street Common Ground has shown that Common Ground supportive housing projects work, and work well in transforming the lives of tenants.

As well as improving their life outcomes, it lessens the burden on emergency services, prevents people from cycling endlessly through the homelessness, health and corrective services systems, and creates a unique opportunity for social inclusion and re-engagement with community.

Five years on, the supportive housing model is now a proven, practical and cost-effective way of responding to the housing and support needs of people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness in Australia.

Launch Housing (formed by the merger of HomeGround Services and Hanover Welfare Services) is committed to expanding the opportunities for further Common Ground projects in Melbourne.

We see supportive housing, including Common Ground and our other project such as Youth Foyers, as an integral part of ending homelessness in Victoria.

Our next project involves developing a Common Ground for families in Melbourne. Prompted by an everincreasing demand for housing and support services for Melbourne mothers, the project will deliver a safe place for families to live and be supported.

As with Elizabeth Street Common Ground, this new project will target some of the most vulnerable women and children in our communities who have been affected by family violence, mental illness, substance issues and interaction with the criminal justice system.
